An Update from Mayor Rob Adams

Spring has always been considered a time for renewal, rebirth and a fresh start. As the leaves start budding on the trees, we will see many other signs of renewal here in Sedona.

The City Council will be working on a new budget for the 2009-2010 fiscal year. The Council and staff have been very conservative in expenditures and revenue forecasts and have been successful in maintaining a tight rein on the budget. The economy has been challenging, but the Council's goal is to continue adequate funding to maintain a high quality of service from our library, chamber of commerce, recycling programs, programs for our seniors and children, and other city funded programs.

A search for a new City Manager began in the fourth quarter of 2008. This spring we anticipate that we will have a new City Manager on board. The City Council has great expectations that this will be a person that respects and understands the special environment in which we live, has a strong financial background and has a vision for how our city can provide an enhanced quality of life for its citizens as well as be a world-class destination for its visitors.

A new performing arts facility will break ground this spring. This will be a 750-seat state-of-the-art complex that will bring national level entertainment to Sedona. The dream that many of the citizens in Sedona have had for so many years will become a reality sometime in 2010 thanks to the voters that approved the bond issue in 2008.

The State Route 179 project is nearing 75% completion, and the vision of the participants in the design process is taking shape. The lighted pedestrian walkways, the bike lanes, the pedestrian bridge and the roundabouts

are going to give an exciting new impression as the gateway to Sedona.

The Sedona RoadRunner circulator system will be entirely revamped as the result of Council action in February 2009. A new park and ride service will be available to our residents in West Sedona to connect not only with the uptown circulator, but also to Cottonwood. It will also be transporting workers and shoppers back and forth between Cottonwood and Sedona eight times a day. Once in Cottonwood, riders will be able to connect with the

Cottonwood transit system. The Cottonwood Area Transit (CAT) will take riders not only through the Cottonwood shopping district, but to Clarkdale as well.

A comprehensive Redevelopment Plan is moving forward for the State Route 89A corridor. A planning team has been organized, and a scope of work is being formulated. There will be an extensive public process to vision how we want this corridor to look and feel in the future. This includes architectural changes, improvements in pedestrian and bicycle access, public transit availability, strategizing the types of businesses that would be available, green building concepts and giving the highway more of a boulevard effect. Another important part of the redevelopment plan is the creation of an alternative code to our present development code. This alternative code would be based on the community vision and would be much more specific in terms of the form and function of development and redevelopment in Sedona.

A leaner City budget with new city management, a performing arts facility, a new gateway to Sedona, improved public transit, and a long-range development plan with a new vision for Sedona are just around the corner. Stay positive, Sedona. Great things are coming our way.

Fiscal Year 2009-2010 Budget

The City has started the process to present a proposed budget for fiscal year 2010 (July 1, 2009 through June 30, 2010). As part of the process, staff received feedback from City Council on Budget Guidelines. Council asked staff to bring a realistic revenue projection, based on balancing the budget and only dipping into reserves if necessary. Their direction included trying to preserve funding for existing programs and provide a sense of security for existing staff.

As a result of those guidelines and the challenges presented by uncertainty in this unprecedented economy, the City Manager is taking the following steps in order to provide an appropriate budget to Council.

1. Staff has been instructed to take a close look at their budget by asking the following questions about their prior year budgets:
 - Was the money spent as intended?
 - Were appropriate processes and procedures followed?
 - Were operations efficient?
 - Did we achieve what we wanted to achieve?
 - What adjustments should we make?
2. In addition to making budget reductions and efficiency improvements where they are able, staff is providing a prioritization for additional funding reductions that could be made at budget time or mid-year in order to be prepared for and respond to the changing economy. The City has not seen tax or monthly fee increases for the last 12 years, but in looking toward the future, some changes to our revenue sources may need to be considered.

The overall goal for this budget process is to achieve a high standard of service within the context of the new stressors facing our local economy. We are attempting to strike a balance to address the current downturn, the anticipated economic situation for the next 12 months to 5 years, and continuing to move Sedona forward.

Update on State Route 179 Project

We are entering the last year of the State Route 179 project. There is on-going construction on almost the entire route from Back O' Beyond through the new roundabouts at the Y and Brewer, as the contractor works hard to complete the project on schedule. All business access remains open and sidewalks are passable from Portal Lane through the Y, so please continue to support your local businesses.

Work is continuing on retaining walls, particularly in front of Hillside, where the wall aesthetics are becoming obvious. The sidewalk will serpentine its way up the wall with appropriate landing areas for easy access to all shops in the Hillside center. Landscaping will be placed at the base of the wall for a pleasant walking experience.

Utility and sewer lines are being placed under the pedestrian bridge. It will be open to the public after all utility work and sidewalk tie-ins are complete. Two-way traffic over Oak Creek will be maintained at all times.

Work is more visible at the Oak Creek Bridge as work is being done on the abutments and piers. Work will continue on the south portion (about 3/5 of the finished product) of the new bridge. When that is complete, both lanes of traffic will be moved to the south portion of the new bridge and the existing roadway bridge will be demolished. Then the northern section of the new roadway bridge will be built. Once the bridge work is complete, the creek channel's riparian habitat will be restored as part of Arizona Department of Transportation's (ADOT) ongoing commitment to the environmental aspects of this beautiful region.

As the final touch, full landscaping for Project 2 will begin later this year north of Canyon Road. All enhancement work is anticipated to be complete by the spring of 2010. It includes pedestrian lighting, decorative walls in the roundabouts, crushed rock ground cover and irrigated natural landscaping in the state right-of-way. South of Canyon, the roundabout islands will be landscaped and crushed rock will be placed in the medians. All the landscaping will be low water use. Selected small portions of the business district will be left open for the community and businesses to plant annual flowers. The City of Sedona will be responsible for the care and upkeep of all the landscaping.

Spring Cleaning Reminders

Spring is in the air and thoughts turn to yard work and other beautifying projects. As you plan these projects, please consider several City requirements that could affect your work. If you are removing weeds and other debris to make your property fire safe or to just clean up, remember to properly dispose of the debris. It is illegal to dispose of trash, soil, rock, or other debris that pollute the public storm drain system. Please don't use the waterways for disposal.

If your project includes placing fill on your property or doing excavation, you need to take steps to prevent erosion. To find out about City requirements, please contact the Public Works Department at 204-7111 or review the General Stormwater Pollution Prevention Guidelines at www.SedonaAZ.gov under "Forms" on the Public Works page.

If your project involves work within the City right-of-way, a permit may be necessary. In many cases a right-of-way permit is required for any activity that disrupts traffic, restricts access or modifies any infrastructure within the right of way. The City right-of-way is property under, on the surface of, adjacent to, and above City roadways, sidewalks and drainage ways. Usually the City right-of-way extends 10 to 20 feet beyond the roadway pavement.

Since the City periodically mows weeds and cleans drainage ways along City streets, contact the Streets Division of Public Works as part of your planning to determine if a right-of-way permit is required. For information, click on "Streets Division" under "Related Links" on the Public Works page.

West Sedona Commercial Corridor Re-Development Plan and Code

Later this spring, the City will be starting a major planning project for the west Sedona commercial area along State Route 89A. The desired outcome will be a safe roadway with better traffic management and future development that is more predictable and sustainable based on the community's vision for the area. This planning process could take over a year to complete and will extensively involve local residents, property owners, and business owners.

This planning project actually combines two previously budgeted planning projects into one: A re-development plan for the west Sedona commercial corridor and a City-wide traffic study. An economic analysis will also be included to ensure a healthy mix of land uses to support and promote diversity and economic sustainability.

An intensive public process is central to this planning effort. Residents, property owners, and business owners will be involved in all of the key steps in creating this plan. This public process is critical to the success of this plan and is the glue that will hold this together.

Why do we need this Plan?

- Since 1991, our Sedona Community Plan has recommended specific planning for this area.
- Many current Community Plan goals cannot be achieved under our current codes, and there are no real development incentives or a strategy in place to achieve these goals.
- There is no plan to control access on the highway – a major cause of traffic congestion.
- The west Sedona commercial corridor is not a pedestrian-friendly environment.

What do we expect from this Plan?

- Predictable development outcomes. Precise and visually-based standards so everyone can see what future development will look like.
- A strategy for highway improvements that address public safety and traffic congestion.
- A plan for a pedestrian-friendly corridor that provides a better sense of community and place and most importantly, brings long-term economic vitality and sustainability to the area.
- A solid foundation for updating the Sedona Community Plan, which is mandated by state law.

Changes resulting from the planning process will be long-term and won't happen overnight, however, the City will be in a much better position to guide new development when it happens.

Where are we in the planning process?

The City is looking for the best consulting team to do the best job possible in making this happen. The City is currently reviewing consultant proposals and a recommendation on consultant selection will tentatively be made to City Council in April 2009. The planning process could be getting underway by May 2009.

Impact of Tourism

Did you know...each year Sedona visitors generate \$10 million in taxes for the City? These taxes represent 70% of the City's general fund, which are used to fund our police force, maintain public parks, upgrade roads, provide general city operations, and much more. You do not pay a property tax to the city; sales taxes pay for our city services.

Did you know...Sedona businesses employ more than 10,000 employees in the tourism industry and generate \$178 million in wages? Another \$52 million in wages is indirectly generated by the industry, from commercial real estate agents and construction workers to local vendors who supply our employees with valuable services (such as dry cleaners, banks, and grocery stores).

Crime Prevention Steps

Ninety-five home and business burglaries were reported to the Sedona Police Department in 2008. To put this into perspective, 43 burglaries were reported to the department in 2006. The number of reported burglaries nearly doubled in 2007 to 87 and continued to climb in 2008.

Although these are Sedona statistics, the Verde Valley region has also been impacted by this crime. With the decline of the economy, law enforcement officials believe the numbers of these crimes will continue to climb. The following prevention steps can help prevent you from becoming a victim of a burglary.

If you are going to be away from your home for an extended period of time, take steps to make it appear it is still inhabited. Cancel newspaper and mail deliveries. Use a timer to turn lights on and off when it is dark outside. Timers can also be used to switch on television or radios at different intervals in different rooms in a house. This gives the impression someone is at home and moving from room to room. Let a trusted neighbor or friend know you will be gone. Ask them to periodically check the residence for you. In Sedona you can sign up for our police volunteers to check on your home with our Vacation Watch program. This can be done on-line at www.SedonaAZ.gov or by calling our dispatcher at (928) 203-0228.

If you don't live in Sedona, check with your local law enforcement agency to see if they have a similar monitoring service. Sedona police recently established the Community Awareness Team (CAT) to assist neighborhoods and businesses to protect themselves from crime. CAT gives presentations to various groups, homeowner associations, etc., to help them help themselves in protecting their neighborhoods or businesses from crime. CAT can also conduct home and business surveys to advise on what steps you can take to protect your home or business against the threat of burglary.
