What is the 2019 Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19)?

The 2019 Novel Coronavirus, or COVID-19, is a new respiratory virus first identified in Wuhan, Hubei Province, China.

How does the virus spread?

This virus probably originally emerged from an animal source but is now spreading from person-to-person. It's important to note that person-to-person spread can happen on a continuum. Some viruses are highly contagious (like measles), while other viruses are less so.

The virus that causes COVID-19 seems to be spreading sustainably in some affected geographic areas. Community spread means people have been infected with the virus in an area, including some who are not sure how or where they became infected.

How can I protect myself?

There is currently no vaccine to prevent COVID-19 respiratory infection. However, the following actions will help prevent the spread of respiratory viruses:

- Get a seasonal flu shot.
- Wash hands frequently.
- Avoid touching eyes, nose or mouth.
- Avoid contact with people who are sick.
- Cover your mouth with your upper sleeve or with a tissue when coughing or sneezing.
- Stay home when you are sick.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces.
- Social distancing for those 60 and older. Social distancing is refraining from congregate settings, avoiding mass gatherings, and maintaining distance of six feet or more whenever possible to limit the ability of the virus to spread.

City moves to virtual and phone services:

Beginning Wednesday, March 18, 2020, the city of Sedona closed to in-person access to city facilities and moved to virtual and phone services. This will be reevaluated on April 5, 2020. Read [this news release](#) for details.



City follows stay-at-home order, business limitation mandates:

On March 30, 2020, Arizona Governor Doug Ducey announced a mandatory stay-at-home [Executive Order](#). Until April 30, 2020, all Arizona residents must stay at home except:

- To conduct or participate in essential activities.
- For employment, to volunteer or participate in essential functions.
- To utilize any services or products provided by essential business services.
- For employment if as a sole proprietor or family owned business, work is conducted in a separate office space from your home and the business is not open to serve the public.

This Executive Order supersedes Sedona Mayor Sandy Moriarty's previous Emergency Proclamation.

Know that the city, in coordination with Coconino and Yavapai counties and their epidemiologists, emergency response teams and policy leaders, healthcare professionals and other stakeholders are monitoring the situation daily and following the guidelines set-forth by the CDC and other federal, state and county government agencies.

How will this affect business?

The city recognizes this is going to be a challenging time for Sedona businesses. However, as the Mayor said in her [letter to the community](#), "It appears that no restrictions can stop what has started, but decisive action can save lives."

Are events canceled?

The city of Sedona cancelled all city-sponsored and city-permitted large gatherings or events, or private gatherings or events on city properties, until May 9, 2020. In accordance with the Governor's Executive Order, all private, non-city events must be canceled unless they are deemed essential services until April 30, 2020.

Cancellations will additionally be made for all non-essential city meetings and programs with the public, until April 30, 2020. The pool is closed until further notice.
